




A survey of 1603 likely voters (including 822 young voters) conducted August 29 to September 4, in nine Senate battleground states

- Conducted online August 29 to September 4, 2022










U.S. Senate Vote: Young voters give Democrats a lead

In this year's election for U.S. Senate, are you more likely to vote for the Republican candidate or the Democratic candidate?








U.S. House Vote

In this year's election for U.S. House of Representatives, are you more likely to vote for the Republican candidate or the Democratic candidate?








Inflation is the top voting issue—but wages are also a top priority for younger voters.

Top issues in deciding whom to vote for in this year's Senate election








Democrats' Challenge: GOP trusted more on inflation.

Do you you have more confidence in the Democrats or more confidence in the Republicans to handle these issues?








GOP trusted more on inflation, but not on wages and workers' rights

Do you you have more confidence in the Democrats or more confidence in the Republicans to handle these issues?






Support for Unions and the PRO Act

Strong approval for unions, especially from young voters


Do you approve or disapprove of labor unions?





Voters see power imbalance between companies and workers


Which is the most accurate description of the relationship between companies and workers today?





Young voters excited by surge in union organizing


What are your feelings on the rise of workers signing petitions asking for union representation in their workplace in the past year?

Which candidate would you be more likely to support?





Overwhelming Support for the PRO Act

A bill has been proposed by Democrats in Congress, called the "Protecting the Right to Organize Act," that would protect workers' right to speak out about low wages, unsafe conditions, or other problems in the workplace, without intimidation or retaliation from their employer. It would also strengthen workers' ability to form a union in their workplace to negotiate for better pay and benefits, safety protections, schedules, and other conditions.


What are your views on the proposed Protecting the Right to Organize Act?






Mobilizing and Persuading Young Voters

Which candidate would you be more likely to support?



Do you you have more confidence in the Democrats or more confidence in the Republicans to handle these issues? (Young Voters)








Strong Democratic Issue Positions


